This presentation aims to explore the relationship between 7th cranial nerve palsy and ocularistry, focusing on the various ophthalmic manifestations, diagnostic challenges, and management strategies associated with this condition. 7th Cranial nerve palsy is categorized as peripheral facial paralysis due to lesions of the 7th facial nerve, resulting in characteristic distortions of the face and possible incomplete eyelid closure (Kelley).
